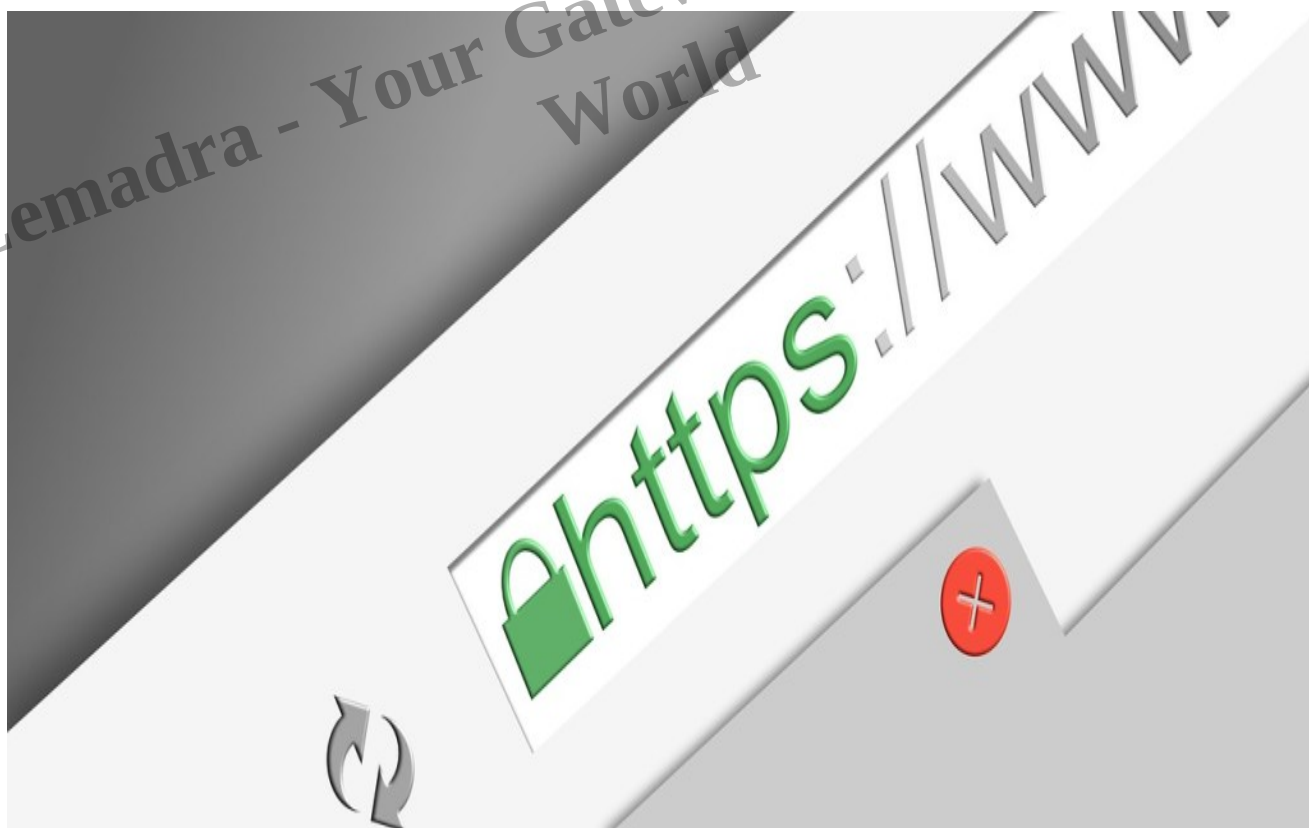




HTTP Response Status Codes: What They Mean and Why They Matter
